

WORD FROM THE MANSE

Dear congregation,

At the manse we have just enjoyed our Thanksgiving meal, an annual feast full of delicious American dishes such as turkey, candied yams, and green bean casserole, followed by pumpkin pie and other desserts. If you were to meet any American towards the end of November then Thanksgiving will not be far from their minds. I truly think that it is one of my favourite parts of American culture. Not much is better than sitting around a table with family and friends enjoying a banquet with good fellowship.

But one thing is needful to remember: if we are celebrating a Thanksgiving dinner, to whom are we giving thanks? Of course the answer is obvious to us in the church – to God. We already give thanks for our food each day through prayer, grateful that God has provided us our daily bread. We know that every good and perfect gift is from Him, as both Scripture and experience teach. Surely complaints should be far from us because our tables are a lot fuller than many by the providence of God.

Millions of Americans will have celebrated Thanksgiving just as we have, with the same types of food as we have enjoyed, yet how many will give thanks to the bountiful God for His gracious provisions? The original intention of the day was to return thanks to God. One of the old Thanksgiving proclamations by Abraham Lincoln in 1863 notes the following about many national blessings: "No human counsel hath devised nor hath any mortal hand worked out these great things. They are the gracious gifts of the Most High God, who, while dealing with us in anger for our sins, hath nevertheless remembered mercy."

Another significant event occurred on the same day as our feast, this time closer to home. The Chancellor, Philip Hammond, delivered his budget to Parliament. In his speech Hammond pledged millions to certain things and promised investments of billions to others. As one of the largest economies in the world the annual budget speech would be an apt opportunity to give public thanks to God for his goodness to us, even in the midst of much transgression. Alas, that is not the practice! How long can we continue to enjoy the Lord's gifts without giving Him service?

How should we respond? Let us be sure that we cultivate within us a thankful heart. When others say to us, "You should be proud of that," or, "You're lucky," or something like that, why not respond, "Well, God has been good"? Is that not a very simple way to turn a conversation around to talk about the most important thing in our lives? I wonder how many evangelistic opportunities such responses could open up.

Leviticus contains the law—holy and just and good.


Numbers records the tribes enrolled-all sons of Abraham's blood.

The broken walls of Salem Nehemiah builds again, While **Esther** saves her people from the plots of wicked men. In **Job** we read how faith will live beneath affliction's rod. And David's **Psalms** are precious songs to every child of God. The **Proverbs** like a goodly string of choicest pearls appear, Ecclesiastes teaches man how vain are all things here. The mystic **Song of Solomon** exalts sweet Sharon's rose, Whilst Christ the Saviour and the King the rapt Isaiah shows. The warning Jeremiah gives apostate Israel scorns, His plaintive Lamentations sore their awful downfall mourns

Ezekiel in wondrous words speaks dazzling mysteries,While kings and empires yet to come Daniel in vision sees.Of judgement and of mercy great Hosea loves to tell;Joel describes the blessed day when God with man shall
